SUPERVISOR COMMENTS

It was a quiet night on graveyards. The highlight of the night involved an auto theft call. The victim reported a female he was "casually" seeing had driven off with his vehicle while he went inside his residence to retrieve an item. The female was left sitting in the passenger seat, and was seen by a witness moving into the driver seat and leaving with the vehicle. The investigation unraveled into different incidents as the officer continued looking into it. Ultimately, the female was contacted on the phone and claimed to be in Atwater. LPRs also showed the vehicle travelling in that direction after the theft. She claimed she did not have the vehicle anymore, and had left it parked with the keys in it. She alleged the male had attempted to strangle her during an argument, which is why she drove away with his car when he went inside. CHP had also pulled the car over in Livingston prior to the vehicle being entered as stolen, and a different female was driving the car at the time. Additionally, the female suspect has outstanding felony warrants out of San Jose and Santa Clara County, and will now have an I&B to arrest for 10851 VC. The DV portion will be forwarded to the DA for review of charges against the male.
